

Are you curious to see how many feathers will fall from Little Snow's big bed this winter?

When the feathery flakes fall from the sky, use a ruler to measure how deep the flakes are on the ground. Keep track of the snowfall on this chart using your high-jumping math skills.

According to picture book meteorologists:
1 inch of snow $=5$ Little Snow jumps
1 inch of snow $=100$ feathers
